5. Accepted abstract will be published in the proceeding and distributed during the meeting of 10th IPSCM.
6. Submission of abstracts does **NOT** constitute registration for the Meeting. All presenters are required to make registration for the Meeting separately. Only one registration form is required for more than one abstract from the same author.

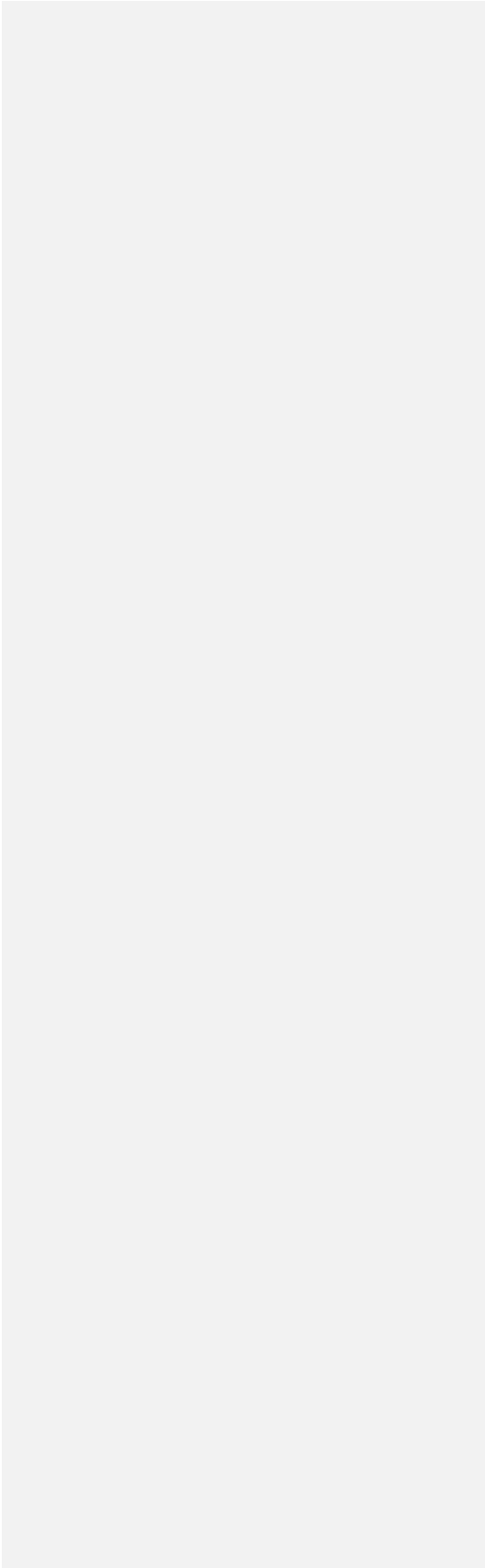

Title: PRELIMINARY STUDY OF "CHANG BI"

中文題目: 腸辟初探

Abstract:

Under the guiding principle of correspondence between nature and human (天人相應), incoherence with the seasonal changes would result in human sickness. In the texts of (*Huangdi's Internal Classic* (黃帝內經), diseased drafts plus contaminated food and drink would result in the intestinal disease of "Chang Bi (辟)". There is only one text of "Chang Bi (辟)" in (*Huangdi's Internal Classic* (黃帝內經), as opposed to seven others of "Chang Pi (澀)" with a "water" key (部首).

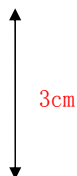
According to *Shuowen Jiezi* (說文解字), "Bi (辟)" means law. As for "Pi (澀)", *Jiyun* (集韻) explains as water between intestines. *Wuwei Medical Bamboo Slips* (武威漢簡) of the Han Dynasty annotates "Bi (辟)" as "wall (壁)". Thus, the character of "Bi (辟)" seems more suitable because it coincides better with the disease signs of bloody, foaming, and purulent stools in (*Huangdi's Internal Classic* (黃帝內經),
